Out of My Mind... and My Heart

A number of our church families have been going through the process of “down-sizing” in preparation for moving ... and some of the suggestions that they have received from realtors about “staging” their home have caused me to look around at my own home. This idea comes at the same time that I tackle my winter project of finishing off the area under the eaves in an upstairs bedroom... an area that has stored many boxes of books and reading materials... some of which I have not opened since I left seminary 25 years ago, but seemed too valuable (and too expensive at the time) to simply toss away.

My brother is going through the same process as he continues to work to make the old family farmhouse in Hill his own permanent home. He hauled truckloads of plastic bins from his previous home in Rhode Island promising himself that “when he had more time, he would cull through all those bins.” Well, now that he has a (wonderful and special) woman in his life, he is being (strongly) urged to look through everything. We both have reminders of our childhood home that we took when our mother moved into a nursing home (Gad! She had saved such stuff!)

Now WHAT should I do with that tin doll house that I played with when I was seven? And that beautiful end table that doesn't even match my décor? And my grandmother's lovely afghan that was always draped over the living-room couch? And the box of very pretty dolls that my mother had collected? And the many mementoes of my travels through Europe while in college and from my Peace Corps experience? And all those books?

And as I admit this, I'm sure many of you are still wondering if I have a warehouse where I keep many of the materials and things that show up at church for the different programs...

I have taken a number of loads of junk to the dump at different times... and I have resisted the temptation to put my valuable junk on top of the dumpster in the hope that someone else will see the fine value of my old stuff. The church yard sale has profited from “stuff” my both my house and my brother's.

And still... there remains such an excess!

Our homes, I guess, have been going through the same process many of us do in our lives. We decide it's time for some renovations or at least a good cleaning and rearranging... this may encourage us to get rid of things we've had hanging around too long.

When we were young, most of us focused our energies on acquisition. We accumulated possessions. We moved to bigger premises to accommodate the children, the cars, the television sets, the books, the animals, the souvenirs...

Later in life, we move into a stage of divestment. Sometimes it's forced upon us, as we leave the family home for space in a seniors' complex. Sometimes it's voluntary, as we look around the burdened shelves, the overflowing storage closets, the cluttered workshops

And we ask, “WHY am I keeping all this... this STUFF?”

If you're old enough to remember comedian George Carlin's hilarious monologue about “Stuff” back in the mid 80s, you've probably already started divesting yourself of “Stuff.”

You start deciding what's worth keeping, and what's not.

In my quest for clearing out, I have made three piles—what really is junk and past its prime (if it really ever HAD a prime!) and goes to the dump. What could be useful to someone else and goes to the Community Thrift Shop or to the church (aarggh) for the Spring Yard Sale.

Unfortunately, there is still a lot of stuff that I look at and think “I could still do something with that!” or “I could use that someday!” I had picked up all that when I thought that I could repair it, recycle it, or restore it to its former glory. I realize that I'm probably not going to do it, after all. I no longer have the interest the intention to “do something with that”... but I wonder WHO might!

Divestment isn't just about things, though. When I was younger, I had strong clear ideas about right and wrong. I wasn't always clear about why. And I didn't always do what I knew I should. But I knew which was which, absolutely.

I'm not so sure any more. Right and wrong tend to dissolve into each other, like wet watercolors. What's right for me may be wrong for someone else. An action that seems right at the time turns out to spread widening ripples of wrong. Meanwhile, an injustice or a tragedy may start wheels turning that eventually benefit everyone.

I wish I knew, sometimes, if I'm still trying to “do something” with the convictions I've carried with me for so many years. Could they be restored to some

News from the Mission Board!

Our February Mission is the Mission Trust Fund. What is the Mission Trust Fund?

Warren Perkins explained it a few years ago saying, "In 1996, our church, its faith in missions, decided to set aside some of these funds to create the Mission Trust Fund. Its purpose was to increase mission giving by providing extra funding earmarked specifically to augment the missions already supported by our members... One of the provisions is that ONLY interest and dividends (and none of the principal) can be used for qualifying mission projects... This fund will continue on and on as the principal grows and as our church continues to grow and expand its work."

This month with our giving we contribute to the principal of the Trust Fund, thus looking to the future and increasing our giving to most of our monthly missions this year.

On February 5 we will celebrate our Souper Bowl of Caring on Super Bowl Sunday. Our youth is asking everyone to bring one food item (or more if you like) and \$1.00 to put into our "Soup Bowl". The food will go to the Meredith Food Pantry and the money will go to the Center Harbor Soup Kitchen.

Since 1990, when a church youth group in South Carolina started the Souper Bowl of Caring, sharing food and money, more than \$81 million has been collected in all 50 states of the U.S. Last year alone over \$9 million was collected and over 4 million cans of food, with 260,000 young people involved. We will be a proud partner in this hunger-relief effort!

As always, the Mission Board is grateful for our church's generosity for all our missions and thanks you for a wonderful spirit of caring and love in our faith community.

Christian Education News

New officers were elected at a recent meeting: John Merrill as Chair, Thom Winslow as Vice-chair, Amy O'Hearn as Secretary, and Rachelle Smith as representative to the Village Pre-school committee. Appointments: Rachelle Smith coordinator of outdoor ministries and Thom Winslow Church School superintendent.

The Acolytes are doing a great job and all agreed the e-mail reminders from John improved participation.

Second Sunday Youth group has not been able to meet yet this year, because many of the same youth are involved in the OWL program. A group enjoyed sledding on a recent Sunday after church and there is discussion of possible future events like bowling. (Any ideas are welcomed—talk with Patte Morrow or Adam Weeks).

OWL is going very well. Attendance is 100% and the group is more than half way through the curriculum. The leaders may try to plan another retreat later in the spring to do multiple sessions all in one weekend.

Church School Superintendent report: 2 checks have been sent to our sponsored child: one for Christmas and one for her birthday. A thank you note was received. Advent afternoon and the pageant went well with excellent participation.

Pastor Carol proposed ideas to help youth earn a church t shirt. Many of the kids already have one. Various ideas were discussed with no final decision.

As requested by the Cabinet, John reviewed a list of delegated duties that the BOCE is involved with. It was decided that the people connected with Christian Education had good delegation and great teamwork within the Church.

Pastor Carol again discussed the National Youth event and various possibilities for mission trips for youth. A bus will be leaving the New England area for the Youth event in Indiana. We hope to have youth represented at this special event.

We would like to renew the Buddy program; if there are adults in the Church that would be interested in having a member of the Church School as a Buddy see Nancy Leighley, John Merrill or Pastor Carol.

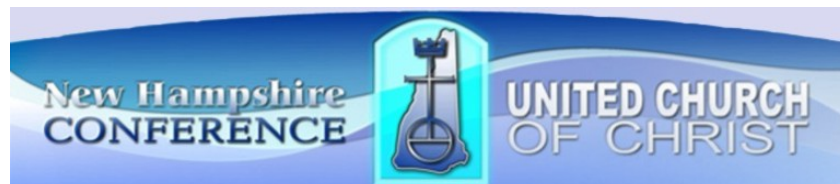
Prepared to Serve

The NH Conference annually sponsors a training event for church leaders; this event includes exhibits, workshops, worship and fellowship. This is a wonderful opportunity to get some great information to help grow our local churches, and to fellowship with other UCCers from around New Hampshire.

This year's 'Prepared to Serve' will be held on Saturday, February 25th from 8:00 AM to 4 PM at Pembroke Academy in Pembroke NH.

During the day, there is opportunity to attend three (or four, if you forego lunch) workshops in the areas of Spirituality, Church Leadership, Caring Ministries, Stewardship, Service and Global Mission, Christian Education and Worship. The registration fee will be \$32 which includes lunch and \$40 (after February 14th).

Trustee's Report

The trustees have decided that we will need to have different members take the chair this year. Kent will continue until Honey Evans can take it during the Summer months. Norman Larson will take for Fall months. The Trustee committee is small in size; it would be helpful to have a list of volunteers who could be called on to complete some of the small necessary tasks around the church. We are looking forward to the Cabinet getting the Team Program underway. We need a team to help on trustee matters.

We ended up the year with a deficit of \$20,614 which was \$6,213 better than we budgeted. We benefited mainly from saving on expenses which were about \$8,100 less than expected. This was offset by income being lower than expected by about \$1,900.

“He died to set us free”

After Abraham Lincoln was assassinated, appropriate funeral ceremonies were held in Washington. Then the body of the beloved President was taken by train to Springfield, Illinois for burial.

The funeral cortege stopped at many towns along the way so that mourning citizens could pay their respects. At a small town in Ohio, a black mother came on board with her small son. As they gazed on the “Great Emancipator,” she said to him, “Take a long look, honey. That man died for you.”

During these days of Lent, we take a long look at Jesus Christ. He died for us! There is a mystery to it, but we can discover that God forgives sin by taking it upon himself. Jesus suffered the sorrow and agony of our rebellion. We become identified with Christ by faith and reconciled to God, so that our sin is removed and we are counted as sons and daughters. When it becomes meaningful to us, we are able to say, “Jesus died for me and now I’ll live for Him.”

Throughout the Lenten season, we are being called to face anew the gift of Christ for us, and to respond with loving, disciplined Christian living.

As we respond to that call, we will discover that we are growing in grace—the grace God offers us in Christ.

What’s Wrong with This Picture?

Kids LOVE doing these puzzles. Some kids work hard to try to find even more mistakes than were intended. You have to look very closely and sometimes, you need to look from a different angle. Sometimes the mistakes are very glaring; other times they are quite subtle. The easy part of this picture puzzle is that once you have found all the mistakes, the work is over.

Lent is a little like these puzzles. We have to take a close look at our lives, sometimes from a little different perspective and ask ourselves “What’s wrong with the whole picture of our lives?” Sometimes the mistakes are glaring, and sometimes they are very subtle. After identifying all the matters, issues and relationships that are wrong, unlike the puzzle, there is more to do. The real work of Lent is to move forward to change and correct those mistakes. Then the picture of our lives is filled with fewer mistakes and is more balanced in its composition.

God’s infinite grace is the means to look at ourselves and to see the mistakes. God’s grace is the means to know that our mistakes are not engraved in stone, but that all things can be made new.

Jesus went to the cross and died for those mistakes-- both the big ones and the small ones. May this period of Lent be a time for all of us to look at our lives and honestly ask “What’s wrong?” and claim God’s grace and guidance to change. May our lives be made right to walk with Jesus as Resurrection people!



A Laughing Jesus

My office is filled with all kinds of pictures, props from children's stories, and special gifts. One picture on the wall is pretty different—it's a \$5 print. It's not really a work of art; it is an illustration. I do not know who executed it. And the subject is quite different as it is a picture of the laughing Jesus.

The picture is striking at first glance, as it portrays Jesus with his head back, mouth open and you can almost hear the loud laughter as though someone told him a funny story or a ridiculous joke.

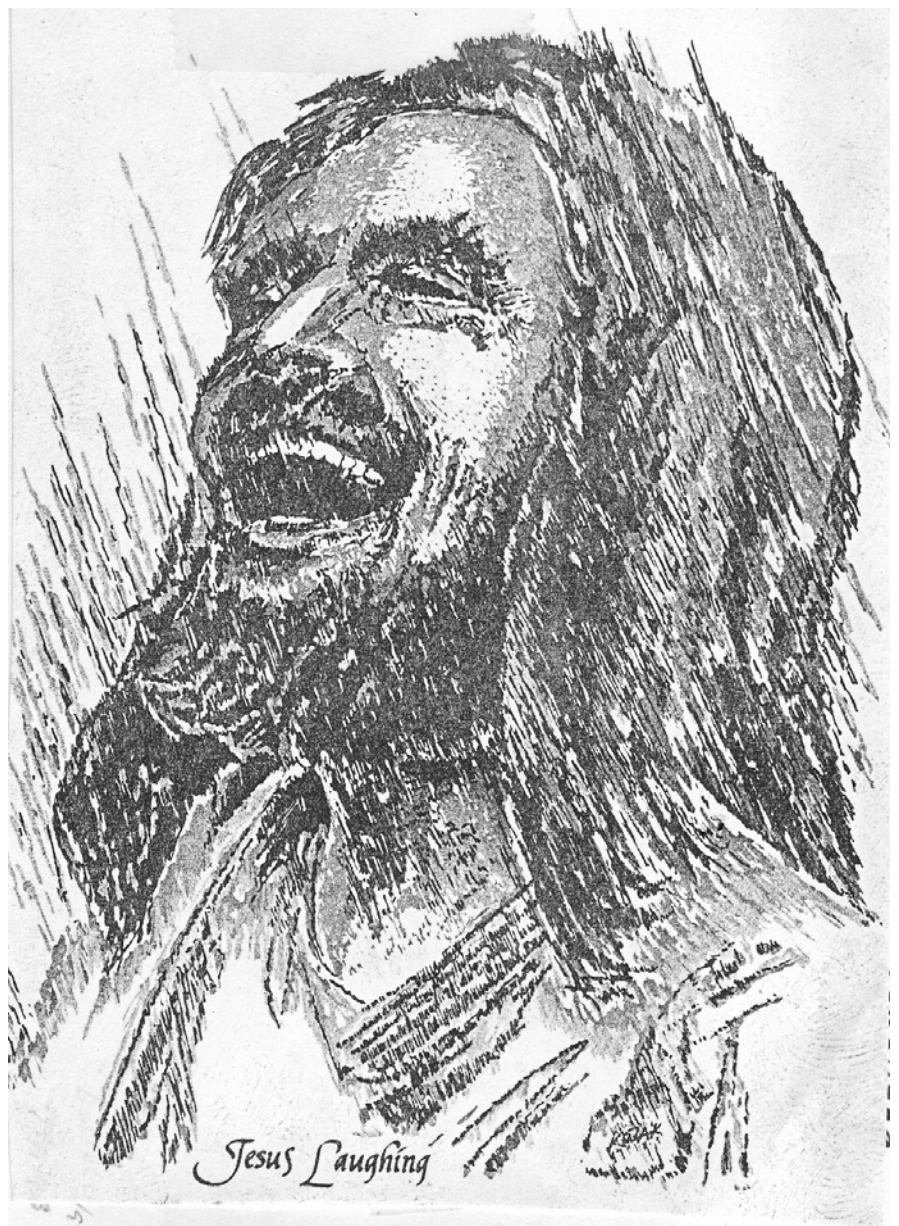
This illustration of a Laughing Christ dramatically confronts the viewer with the reality that Jesus lived life to the fullest and experienced every happening that we face in life.

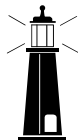
It also reminds me that Jesus laughed in the face of the most serious things—like disease, Discrimination and death. He had the power to overcome all those situations... and He still shares that power with us in these days.

A businessman sat with me while ago, sharing his feelings of guilt and sorrow over an affair he had with a young woman. He scarcely could stand to look into the eyes of his wife or children because of his shame.

He suddenly looked up at the Laughing Christ, remained silent for a moment, and then explained, "You know, I really believe a man like that can understand and forgive a person who has made a fool of himself."

This is the central message of Lent. We generally think of Lent as a solemn and somber season of the year... but Jesus breaks into our serious considerations with some serious grace of His own... and invites us to join in holy laughter as we conquer the ills of the world.





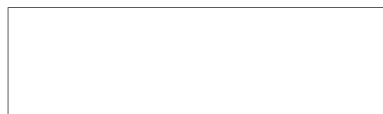


