News from the Board of Missions

October Mission of the Month— Interlakes Community Caregivers

Twenty-seven years ago, a small group of concerned church members at Center Harbor Congregational Church realized that some people were unable to get to their doctors' appointments because they could not drive. That was a beginning of Interlakes Community Caregivers (ICC)—to provide rides to medical appointments (and other necessary activities).

Since then, thousands of "neighbors" have been driven to appoint-

ments (both local and more distant), and many more needs have been met that allow people in our Lakes Region to safely remain in their homes.

Caregivers has grown from a small idea in our church to a vibrant and wide-spread organization serving thousands of people living in the Lakes Region. A host of volunteers make up the background of service providers, all led and coordinated by a dedicated staff.

Fire Inspection Plan and Important Projects

After having our fire monitoring system inspected in 2025, for the first time in 17 years, the Property Group realized we needed to establish a more regular pattern of inspection. We also needed to start replacing the very old smoke detectors. Note that all the smoke detectors passed the inspection this year.

In September, the Property Group proposed a plan to the Cabinet, and it was approved. The Fire System will be inspected every 2 years and we will start replacing the 12 old smoke detectors at a rate of 4 per inspection year. This will kick off in 2026, and all the smoke detectors will have been updated by 2030. This spreads out the cost while maintaining a reasonable review and update of this important safety system.

Before the winter sets in, we are trying to finish a few projects. We need to replace the decking on the handicapped entrance ramp in the back of Gilpatric Hall. The framing and railing is in OK shape, and we will make patch repairs as needed. We will be using Trex decking. A workday or two will be announced soon, probably in early November. When you see the announcement, please offer to help if you can.



News Fall Lessons in Sunday School

In September the Sunday School classes focused on learning some psalms and how they can help us in our daily lives. With the introduction of Psalm 23 the children learned that God is with them in good and bad times. Psalm 91 taught the children that God will answer them if they call. With the emphasis on Psalm 121 the students learned that God is with them day and night. The final psalm that was taught was Psalm 146, which explained to the students that God lifts up those who bow down.

In October and November the students have learned and will continue to learn about how the Jewish people were displaced from their homeland and exiled to Babylon. These were terrifying times for the people whose future was unclear in a strange land. However, Jeremiah assured them that God had a plan for them. The Jewish people just needed to trust in God's promises, have faith and hope, and make the best of their circumstances to realize His plan.

We thank Him for the water that comes out of the earth and runs for our lands.

We thank Him for certain timbers that grow and have fluids coming from them for us all.

We thank Him for the branches of the trees that grow shadows for our shelter.

We thank Him for the beings that come from the west, the thunder and lightning that water the earth.

We thank Him for the light which we call our oldest brother, the sun that works for our good.

We thank Him for all the fruits that grow on the trees and vines.

We thank Him for his goodness in making the forests, and thank all its trees.

We thank Him for the darkness that gives us rest, and for the kind Being of the darkness that gives us light, the moon.

We give Him thanks for our supporters, who had charge of our harvests.
