# Changes Coming in the New Hampshire Conference

There are some big structural changes coming in the New Hampshire Conference this year. Presently, the Conference is composed of seven Associations. Ours is the Merrimack Association, and it is one of the most active Associations in the state. Our elected positions are all staffed, and we have led the way in providing programs at the Association level that smaller churches cannot provide for themselves, such as Confirmation class.

Several of the other Associations, however, simply do not have the number of churches, settled clergy, and interested lay persons to fill their officer and committee roles, so that for the past several years it has been impossible for these Associations to hold business meetings with a proper quorum, or have someone to sign checks, field a committee on church and ministry to authorize ministry, or hold ordinations or installations. For these Associations, the basic work of the wider church just isn't getting done right now, and some of the churches themselves feel disconnected from one another.

So, last fall, the Merrimack Association and five other Associations in New Hampshire voted to move to a "Conference Acting as Association" model, which is already in use in several other smaller states. One Association, Grafton-Orange-Sullivan, has not yet voted to join the new model, and may not do so. That Association includes churches from both New Hampshire and Vermont, and its two-state status predates the establishment of the United Church of Christ in 1957, so its case is much more complicated.

Under the new model, all the necessary functions of Associations – authorizing ministry, supporting local churches, preparing candidates for ordination, managing business affairs, etc. – will be handled by committees at the Conference level. We are already sharing responsibility Conference-wide in preparation of candidates for ordination and in overseeing clergy where there are questions of fitness for ministry, so moving to the new model where all Association responsibilities are shared

across the Conference should be a good fit for us. It will also make our work much more efficient. Conference-wide right now, there are about one hundred Association-level positions to fill (seven moderators, seven treasurers, seven scribes, seven committees on church and ministry, etc.). Under the new model, there will be only about fifty positions to fill. This is a year of transition to the new model – sharing information widely and meeting legal requirements. Recently, I agreed to step in as Merrimack Association secretary specifically because the Association cannot legally dissolve itself without a secretary to sign the documentation. We will meet as the Merrimack Association this spring (April 14 in North Barnstead) and again in the fall, and then – hopefully – we will be ready to move fully into the new Conference Acting as Association model in 2025.

Please be in prayer for all the churches in New Hampshire as we move into this exciting new way of being in covenant with one another as the Body of Christ.

### **Diary of a Jesus Tagalong Discussion Group**



### News from the Board of Missions

April Mission of the Month: New Beginnings



Spring is arriving, and with it the promise of new beginnings in the form of flower petals, the smell of fresh earth, and the warm sun on our faces. In April, we ask that you support the Mission of the Month, New Beginnings. Their mission statement is:

"New Beginnings – Without Violence & Abuse is dedicated to ending sexual, domestic, and stalking violence through the provision of safe and effective services, including emergency refuge and support; and works toward social change by promoting an effective community response to violence."

Their philosophy is that no one deserves to be beaten or raped or to live in fear of being beaten or raped. Domestic violence, including emotional, physical and verbal abuse, as well as sexual assault are intolerable and must be abolished from our society.

To meet this mission, the organization offers a shelter and emergency food, clothing and supplies to victims. New Beginnings also offers a 24-hour hotline for people experiencing abuse and support for their children who have witnessed or been affected by domestic or sexual violence. They also offer advocates to accompany victims to the police or to court, one-to-one peer support, as well as larger support groups.
